BUILDING GOING UP: BUYOBO, UGANDA JANUARY 2009

JANUARY 2009

Local counselors show WMI board members the property markers designating the land the local council donated for construction of WMI's headquarters and a community meeting hall. The Bulambuli Widow's Ass'n, which runs the microfinance program, will also use the building. Towards Sustainability Foundation provided a grant to WMI to cover the cost of construction.



FEBRUARY 2009
